DENIM DAY SCHOLARSHIP NEWS

Each year in April, which is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, we highlight "Denim Day," which began in an effort to bring awareness to victim blaming and destructive myths that surround sexual violence.

Why Denim? It all began after a ruling by the Italian Supreme Court where a rape conviction was overturned because the justices felt that since the victim was wearing tight jeans she must have helped the person who raped her by removing her jeans, thereby implying consent.

The following day, the women in the Italian Parliament came to work wearing jeans to show solidarity with the victim and from there the campaign grew to be a global awareness event.

Denim Day was April 29th and New Horizons collected submissions throughout April for our annual Denim Day Scholarship Essay Contest from area high school seniors.

Congratulations to Logan High School's Sophia McGaff on

writing a compelling essay that has garnered her a \$500 scholarship for her continuing education! We will put her complete essay out to the world very soon, but in the meantime, you can read an excerpt of it here:

"Victim blaming tendencies begin to occur at any time in which students



are asked to take responsibility for their own sexual assault prevention.

Unfortunately, the prevalence of victim-blaming as it relates to sexual assault, is often justified by faulty and harmful gender-based stereotypes of sexuality. When considering this topic, "boys will be boys" is often a phrase that comes to mind. Girls are often taught ways to avoid sexual assault that blame assault on women not understanding male sexuality, and excuse men from the responsibility of their behaviors for the same reason.

Certified sex therapist Laura Rademacher states that culturally, we excuse jokes that trivialize sexual assault as merely jokes about "real men." Dress codes in schools have been justified as ways to prevent boys from "getting distracted." These faulty perceptions of male sexuality are commonly used to excuse sexually violent behaviors and discourage adequate disciplinary responses."

It's been trying at times, but our team is incredible at rising to challenges. Especially our advocates who are serving victims of abuse at our shelter.
